# BILL

**To amend the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, in accordance with the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009; and to provide for matters connected therewith.**

## PREAMBLE

**WHEREAS** section 214(1) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, requires an Act of Parliament to provide for—

- (a) the equitable division of revenue raised nationally among the national, provincial and local spheres of government;
- (b) the determination of each province's equitable share of the provincial share of that revenue; and
- (c) any other allocations to provinces, local government or municipalities from the national government's share of that revenue, and any conditions on which those allocations may be made;

**WHEREAS** the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022), gives effect to section 214(1) of the Constitution in respect of the 2022/23 financial year;

**AND WHEREAS** section 12(4) of the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009 (Act No. 9 of 2009), requires the Minister of Finance to table a Division of Revenue Amendment Bill with a revised fiscal framework if the adjustments budget effects changes to the Division of Revenue Act for the relevant year,

**B**E IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Parliament of the Republic of South Africa, as follows:—

### **Amendment of section 7 of Act 5 of 2022**

1. Section 7 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, is hereby amended by the addition of subsection (4):

“(4) (a) A Member of the Executive Council responsible for finance in a province may pledge a conditional allocation or an envisaged conditional allocation, or a portion thereof, as security for any borrowing in terms of the Borrowing Powers of Provincial Governments Act, 1996 (Act No. 48 of 1996), in accordance with this subsection.

(b) If a Member of the Executive Council responsible for finance in a province intends to pledge as envisaged in paragraph (a), he or she must—

- (i) consult the relevant transferring officer; and
- (ii) obtain the approval of the Loan Co-ordinating Committee, referred to in section 2 of Borrowing Powers of Provincial Governments Act, 1996.

(c) The pledging envisaged in paragraph (a) must comply with any conditions imposed by the Loan Co-ordinating Committee.

(d) The relevant receiving officer must submit financial and non-financial reports, in the format and on the dates determined by the National Treasury, for any project pledged to be partially or fully funded by using a conditional allocation or an envisaged conditional allocation, or a portion thereof, as security as envisaged in paragraph (a).”.

**Substitution of Column A of Schedules 1 and 2, Column A of Part A of Schedule 4, Column A of Part B of Schedule 5, Column A of Part B of Schedule 6 and Columns A of Parts A and B of Schedule 7 to Act 5 of 2022**

2. (1) Column A of Schedule 1 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Schedule 1 to the principal Act, setting out the equitable division of revenue raised nationally among the national, provincial and local spheres of government for the 2022/23 financial year. 5

(2) Column A of Schedule 2 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Schedule 2 to the principal Act, setting out the determination of each provincial sphere's equitable share of the provincial sphere's share of revenue raised nationally for the 2022/23 financial year. 10

(3) Column A of Part A of Schedule 4 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Part A of Schedule 4 to the principal Act, specifying the allocations to provinces to supplement the funding of programmes or functions funded from provincial budgets for the 2022/23 financial year. 15

(4) Column A of Part B of Schedule 5 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Part B of Schedule 5 to the principal Act, specifying the specific-purpose allocations to municipalities for the 2022/23 financial year.

(5) Column A of Part B of Schedule 6 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Part B of Schedule 6 to the principal Act, specifying the allocations-in-kind to municipalities for designated special programmes for the 2022/23 financial year. 20

(6) Column A of Part A of Schedule 7 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Part A of Schedule 7 to the principal Act, specifying allocations to provinces for immediate disaster response for the 2022/23 financial year.

(7) Column A of Part B of Schedule 7 to this Act is hereby substituted for Column A of Part B of Schedule 7 to the principal Act, specifying allocations to municipalities for immediate disaster response for the 2022/23 financial year. 25

**Short title**

3. This Act is called the Division of Revenue Amendment Act, 2022.

**MEMORANDUM ON OBJECTS OF DIVISION OF REVENUE  
AMENDMENT BILL, 2022**

**1. BACKGROUND**

- 1.1 Section 214(1) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 (“the Constitution”), requires that an Act of Parliament be enacted to provide for—
- (a) the equitable division of revenue raised nationally among the national, provincial and local spheres of government;
  - (b) the determination of each province’s equitable share of the provincial share of that revenue; and
  - (c) any other allocations to provinces, local government or municipalities from the national government’s share of that revenue, and any conditions on which those allocations may be made.
- 1.2 Section 12(4) of the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009 (Act No. 9 of 2009), requires the Minister of Finance to table a Division of Revenue Amendment Bill with a revised fiscal framework if the adjustments budget effects changes to the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 (Act No. 5 of 2022) (“the DoRA”), for the relevant financial year. As the adjustments budget for 2022/23 effects changes to the DoRA, it is necessary for the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022 (“the Bill”), to be tabled with the revised fiscal framework.
- 1.3 The Bill is thus introduced in compliance with the requirements of the Constitution and the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009.

**2. SUMMARY OF BILL**

- 2.1 Clause 1 of the Bill proposes an addition to section 7 of the DoRA to allow for the pledging of conditional allocations and envisaged conditional allocations.
- 2.2 Clause 2 of the Bill proposes the replacement in the DoRA of—
- (a) Column A of Schedule 1;
  - (b) Column A of Schedule 2;
  - (c) Column A of Part A of Schedule 4;
  - (d) Column A of Part B of Schedule 5;
  - (e) Column A of Part B of Schedule 6;
  - (f) Column A of Part A of Schedule 7; and
  - (g) Column A of Part B of Schedule 7.
- 2.3 Column A specifies the allocations for the 2022/23 financial year. Amendments to allocations are indicated in Column A by indicating the adjustment and the adjusted amount. The Schedules to the Bill address the following matters:
- (a) Adjusting the equitable share among the three spheres of government;
  - (b) changes to equitable share to provinces;
  - (c) changes to allocations to provinces to supplement the funding of programmes or functions funded from provincial budgets for the 2022/23 financial year;
  - (d) changes to specific-purpose allocations to municipalities for the 2022/23 financial year;
  - (e) changes to allocations in-kind to municipalities for designated special programmes for the 2022/23 financial year; and
  - (f) changes to allocations to provinces and municipalities for immediate disaster response for the 2022/23 financial year.
- 2.4 Clause 3 of the Bill contains the short title.

### 3. ORGANISATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS CONSULTED

The following institutions were consulted on the adjustments proposed in the Bill:

- Financial and Fiscal Commission;
- South African Local Government Association; and
- National and provincial departments.

### 4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS TO THE STATE

This Bill is necessitated by the proposed national adjustment budget for the 2022/23 financial year which affects the division of revenue between the three spheres of government. Financial implications to government are limited to the total transfers to provinces and local government as indicated in the Schedules to the Bill.

### 5. CONSTITUTIONAL IMPLICATIONS

The Bill, in conjunction with the DoRA, seeks to give effect to section 214 of the Constitution.

### 6. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

- 6.1 The Constitution prescribes the classification of Bills. Therefore, a Bill must be correctly classified otherwise it will be constitutionally out of order.
- 6.2 The State Law Advisers and the National Treasury have considered the Bill against the provisions of the Constitution relating to the tagging of Bills, and against the functional areas listed in Schedule 4 (functional areas of concurrent national and provincial legislative competence) and Schedule 5 (functional areas of exclusive provincial legislative competence) to the Constitution.
- 6.3 For the purposes of tagging, the constitutional court case of *Tongoane and Others v Minister for Agriculture and Land Affairs and Others CCT 100/09 [2010] ZACC 10*, confirmed the “substantial measure” test indicated in *Ex Parte President of the Republic of South Africa: In re Constitutionality of the Liquor Bill*. The test entailed that “any Bill whose provisions in substantial measure” fall within a specific Schedule must be classified in terms of that Schedule.
- 6.4 In terms of section 76(3) of the Constitution, a Bill must be dealt with in accordance with the procedure established by either subsection (1) or (2) if it falls within a functional area listed in Schedule 4 to the Constitution. Furthermore, in terms of section 76(4)(b) of the Constitution, a Bill must be dealt with in accordance with the procedure established by section 76(1) of the Constitution, if it provides for legislation envisaged in Chapter 13 of the Constitution and includes provisions affecting the financial interests of the provincial sphere of government.
- 6.5 The issue that needs to be determined is whether the proposed amendments as contained in the Bill, in substantial measure, fall within a functional area listed in Schedule 4 to the Constitution, or whether the proposed amendments fall under section 76(4)(b) of the Constitution.
- 6.6 The Bill seeks to amend the DoRA in accordance with section 12(4) of the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009, which provides that the Minister must table a Division of Revenue Amendment Bill with the revised fiscal framework if the adjustments budget effects changes to the Division of Revenue Act for the relevant year.
- 6.7 The provisions of the Bill have been carefully examined, and in our view, they amount to legislation envisaged in Chapter 13 of the Constitution. Furthermore, the Bill includes provisions affecting the financial interests of the provincial sphere of government as contemplated in section 76(4)(b) of the

Constitution. We are therefore of the opinion that the Bill must be dealt with in accordance with the procedure envisaged by section 76(1) of the Constitution.

- 6.8 The State Law Advisers and the National Treasury are of the opinion that it is not necessary to refer the Bill to the National House of Traditional and Khoi-San Leaders in terms of section 39(1)(a) of the Traditional and Khoi-San Leadership Act, 2019 (Act No. 3 of 2019), since it does not contain provisions pertaining to customary law or customs of traditional communities.

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# A

## Explanatory memorandum to the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill

### ■ Background

The allocation of resources to the three spheres of government is a critical step in the budget process, required before national government, the nine provinces and 257 municipalities can determine their own budgets. The allocation process takes into account the powers and functions assigned to the three spheres of government. The process for making this decision is at the heart of cooperative governance as envisaged in the Constitution. To foster transparency and ensure smooth intergovernmental relations, section 214(1) of the Constitution requires that every year a Division of Revenue Act determine the equitable division of nationally raised revenue between the three spheres of government. The Intergovernmental Fiscal Relations Act, 1997, prescribes the process for determining the equitable sharing and allocation of revenue raised nationally.

This Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022, (“the Bill”) fulfils the requirement set out in section 12(4) of the Money Bills and Related Matters Act, 2009 (Act 9 of 2009), that the Minister of Finance must table a division of revenue amendment Bill with the revised fiscal framework if the adjustments budget effects changes to the Division of Revenue Act for the relevant year. Section 10(5) of the Intergovernmental Fiscal Relations Act requires that the Division of Revenue Bill must be accompanied by an explanatory memorandum detailing how the Bill takes account of the matters listed in sections 214(2)(a) to (j) of the Constitution; government’s response to the recommendations of the Financial and Fiscal Commission (FFC); and any assumptions and formulae used in arriving at the respective divisions among provinces and municipalities. As the FFC’s recommendations are specific to the main budget and none of the formulae used in the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, (Act 5 of 2022) have been changed, this explanatory memorandum only contains three parts:

- Part 1 describes the factors that inform the division of resources between the three spheres of government.
- Part 2 describes the proposed amendments to the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, and their impact on the different spheres of government.
- Part 3 describes changes to the frameworks and detailed allocations per province and municipality that have been gazetted in terms of section 15(1) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022. The changes are submitted to Parliament for consideration as envisaged in sections 15(2) and 15(4) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022.

The Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022, and its underlying allocations are the culmination of extensive consultation processes between national, provincial and local government. The Budget Council and Local Government Budget Forum deliberated on the matters discussed in this memorandum. The approach to local government allocations has been discussed with organised local government (South African Local Government Association) at technical meetings, culminating in a meeting of the Local Government Budget Forum.

## Part 1: Constitutional considerations

Section 214 of the Constitution requires that the annual Division of Revenue Act be enacted only after taking account of factors in sub-sections (2)(a) to (j) of the Constitution. These include the national interest; provision for debt; the needs of national government and emergencies; the allocation of resources to provide basic services and meet developmental needs; fiscal capacity and efficiency of the provincial and local spheres; the reduction of economic disparities; and the promotion of stability and predictability. Annexure W1 to the 2022 Division of Revenue Bill outlined in detail how these considerations were taken into account in the 2022 Division of Revenue. None of the adjustments in this Bill alter the constitutional considerations that informed the 2022 Division of Revenue.

## Part 2: Summary of changes in the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022

An adjustments budget provides for unforeseen and unavoidable expenditure; appropriation of monies already announced during the tabling of the annual budget (but not allocated at that stage); the shifting of funds between and within votes where a function is transferred; the utilisation of savings; and the roll-over of unspent funds from the preceding financial year. If the adjustments budget effects changes to the division of revenue as contained in the Division of Revenue Act for the relevant year, the Minister of Finance must table a Division of Revenue Amendment Bill with the revised framework. There are amendments to the 2022 Budget that affect the Division of Revenue Act, 2022 which will be effected through the Division of Revenue Amendment Act, 2022, once enacted. The amendments as they impact on provinces and municipalities are discussed in detail below.

### Shifting of disaster funding

To allow for adequate response to the April 2022 floods, funding was shifted between disaster grants through a gazette in August 2022. R145 million was shifted from the *provincial disaster response grant* to the *municipal disaster response grant*. R120 million was shifted from the *municipal emergency housing grant* to the *provincial emergency housing grant*. These changes are shown in Schedule 7, Parts A and B of this Bill.

### Additional funding for disaster response

In response to disasters that have occurred, most of the disaster funding has been depleted. To enable for response in the event that a disaster occurs in the remaining months of the current financial year, additional funding is added to disaster grants. R97 million is added to the *provincial disaster response grant* and R248 million is added to the *municipal disaster response grant* to enable provinces and municipalities to respond should a disaster occur. To enable for response to a housing emergency as a result of a disaster occurring, R350 million is added to the *provincial emergency housing grant* to replenish the grant.

For the reconstruction and rehabilitation of schools damaged by floods in December 2021 and April 2022, R117 million is added to the *education infrastructure grant* for schools in the Eastern Cape and KwaZulu-Natal provinces. R1 billion is added to the *provincial roads maintenance grant* for the Eastern Cape, KwaZulu-Natal and North West provinces for the repair of provincial roads damaged by the April 2022 floods. For the reconstruction and rehabilitation of municipal infrastructure damaged by flash floods in the Western Cape (Overberg District Municipality, Cape Winelands District Municipality and Garden Route District Municipality) in December 2021 and the April 2022 floods in the Eastern Cape (Winnie Madikizela-Mandela Local Municipality) and KwaZulu-Natal (eThekweni Metropolitan Municipality, uMhlathuze Local Municipality, uThukela District Municipality, uMgungundlovu District Municipality and iLembe District Municipality), R3.3 billion is added to the *municipal disaster recovery grant*. R92 million is added to the *informal settlements upgrading partnership grant: municipalities* for eThekweni Metropolitan Municipality for the purchase of land identified for the relocation of flood victims who were previously residing in informal settlements that were washed away by April 2022 floods. To continue with the care and protection of April 2022 flood victims placed in shelters in KwaZulu-Natal, R49 million is added to the *provincial equitable share*. These funds will be used for provision of formula and disposable nappies for babies, provision of meals for people in the shelters, payment of shelter-based social workers and social worker supervisors and for payment of the system used by shelters to track

progress of people within the shelters. These changes are shown in Schedule 2; Schedule 4, Part A; Schedule 5, Part B and Schedule 7, Parts A and B of this Bill.

### **Changes to provincial allocations**

#### *Additional allocation for the building of rural bridges*

To assist with the movement of people in rural areas, funding is allocated for the construction of modular steel bridges under the Welisizwe Rural Bridges Programme. These bridges are required to ensure that communities in these rural areas are able to access schools, clinics and other government services. R389 million is allocated through the *provincial roads maintenance grant* to the Eastern Cape and Limpopo provinces for this purpose. This change is shown in Schedule 4, Part A of this Bill.

### **Changes to local government allocations**

#### *Roll-over of funds in the integrated national electrification programme (municipal) grant*

R1 million is rolled over in the *integrated national electrification programme (municipal) grant* to fund 50 electrification connections in Sewendelaan in Dikgatlong Local Municipality. This change is shown in Schedule 5, Part B of this Bill.

#### *Roll-over of funds in the indirect regional bulk infrastructure grant*

R15 million is rolled over in the indirect *regional bulk infrastructure grant* to fund operational payments for the Vaal River pollution remediation project in Emfuleni Local Municipality. This change is shown in Schedule 6, Part B of this Bill.

#### *Reprioritisation in the neighbourhood development partnership grant*

R100 million of the *neighbourhood development partnership grant* is shifted from Schedule 5, Part B (direct) to Schedule 6, Part B (indirect) to fund project preparation, planning and implementation for municipalities that are having administrative and financial challenges that are affecting project implementation. These funds will be used for projects they were allocated for in the direct component. Affected municipalities are Mogale City Local Municipality, KwaDukuza Local Municipality and Emfuleni Local Municipality. These changes are shown in Schedule 5, Part B and Schedule 6, Part B of this Bill.

## **Part 3: Changes to gazetted frameworks and allocations**

Together with the tabling of the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022, National Treasury also submits to Parliament proposed changes to gazetted conditional grant frameworks and allocations. Section 15(4) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, requires National Treasury to consult Parliament on any proposed changes to a conditional grant framework for the purposes of correcting an error or omission, as envisaged in Section 15(2) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022.

The proposed changes to conditional grant frameworks are described below and the revised frameworks and detailed allocations are included in the annexures and appendices to the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022. While these changes do not form part of the Bill, Parliament is requested to consider them in terms of the process set out in Section 15(4) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022. Proposed changes to gazetted allocation appendixes that provide further details of grant allocations are also included here.

#### *Provincial roads maintenance grant*

The grant framework for the *provincial roads maintenance grant* is amended to allow for spending to respond to the disaster that occurred in April 2022; and to also allow for spending on rural bridges under the Welisizwe Rural Bridges Programme.



*Additional conditions for funds to respond to the December 2021 and April 2022 disasters*

The grant frameworks for the *education infrastructure grant* and the *municipal disaster recovery grant* are amended to allow for spending to respond to the disasters that occurred in December 2021 and April 2022.

*Informal settlements upgrading partnership grant: municipalities*

The grant framework for the *informal settlements upgrading partnership grant: municipalities* is amended to ring-fence funds for the purchase of identified land for the relocation of flood victims who were previously residing in informal settlements that were washed away by April 2022 floods in eThekweni Metropolitan Municipality.

**Changes to allocations**

Details per municipality of the changes to allocations for the *municipal disaster recovery grant*, *informal settlements upgrading partnership grant: municipalities*, *neighbourhood development partnership grant* and *regional bulk infrastructure grant* that have been described in part 2 of this memorandum will be gazetted. These changes per municipality are shown in Annexures D and E; and Appendix A. These annexures and appendix include a change of the name of Engcobo Local Municipality in the Eastern Cape to Dr. A.B. Xuma Local Municipality as per the *Gazette* published in terms of section 12 of the Local Government: Municipal Structures Act, on 30 May 2022.

Details of the changes per provincial department for disaster response allocations in the *education infrastructure grant* and *provincial roads maintenance grant* are shown in Appendix B.

## **Annexure B: Frameworks for Conditional Grants to Provinces**

### **Detailed frameworks on Schedule 4 grants to provinces**

#### **Introduction**

This annexure provides the revised frameworks for the grants set out in Part A of Schedule 4 of the 2022 Division of Revenue Amendment Bill. The following are key areas considered for each grant:

- Strategic goal and purpose of the grant
- Outcome statements and outputs of the grant
- Priority(ties) of government that the grant primarily contributes to
- Conditions of the grant (additional to what is required in the Bill)
- Criteria for allocation between provinces
- Rationale for funding through a conditional grant
- Past performance
- The projected life of the grant
- 2022 MTEF allocations
- The payment schedule
- Responsibilities of transferring national department and receiving provincial departments
- Process for approval of business plans for 2023/24

The attached frameworks are not part of the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill but are published in order to provide more information on each grant to parliament, legislatures, municipal councils, officials in all three spheres of government and the public. Once the Division of Revenue Amendment Bill, 2022 is enacted, these frameworks will be gazetted.

The financial statements and annual reports for 2022/23 will report against the Division of Revenue Act, Division of Revenue Amendment Act and their schedules, and the grant frameworks as gazetted in terms of the Act. Such reports must cover both financial and non-financial performance, focusing on the outputs achieved.

- Payment of subsequent instalments is dependent upon the submission of the following:
  - previous quarter's monthly infrastructure reporting model reports
  - all quarterly performance reports that have become due, in terms of the Division of Revenue Act, prior to date of release of payment
- The signed-off annual grant performance evaluation report and signed off draft road asset management plan and project list in table B5 format will remain a requirement for the second instalment as required by the Division of Revenue Act and the requirements of this framework
- The infrastructure programme management plan and road asset management systems data submission will be a requirement for the third tranche
- The infrastructure programme implementation plan and 2023/24 project list will be a requirement for the fourth tranche
- For the Road Infrastructure Strategic Framework class R1, R2 and R3 roads, the data collection requirements are:
  - visual condition data according to technical methods for highway nine for pavements no older than two years, and technical methods for highway 19 for bridges no older than five years
  - instrumental pavement data for roughness, rut depth and macro texture according to technical methods for highway 13 no older than two years
  - instrumental pavement data for deflections according to technical methods for highway 13 no older than five years
  - traffic data according to technical methods for highway three, technical methods for highway eight and technical methods for highway 14 no older than three years
- Provinces must submit to the DoT, updated road condition data, (for paved and unpaved) including instrumental/ automated road survey data, traffic data, safety audit report and bridge conditions by 30 September 2022
- The Provincial Road Maintenance Grant (PRMG) allocation can be allocated to the following projects as identified and prioritised through the provincial road asset management systems:
  - routine maintenance (operating expenditure): includes day-to-day routine activities such as cleaning drains and culverts, vegetation control, line marking, guard rail repair, road sign repair, crack sealing, patching, edge repair, spot regravelling, and blading
  - periodic maintenance (operating expenditure): includes periodically scheduled activities such as fog sprays/diluted emulsions/rejuvenators, surface seals and functional asphalt overlays < 50 mm in thickness. For gravel roads it includes re-gravelling up to 100 mm thick
  - special maintenance (operating expenditure): includes the repair of selected pavement areas up to maximum of 25 per cent of project length followed by application of surface seal or functional asphalt overlay < 50 mm. Also includes reinstatement of slope stability, repairs to existing structures and the repair of damage caused by floods or accidents
  - rehabilitation (capital expenditure): includes increasing the structural capacity of an existing pavement through the recycling of existing layers and/or addition of new granular layers or structural asphalt overlays > 80 mm thick and upgrading or block paving of gravel roads with more than 300 vehicles per day. These rehabilitation activities are however limited to a maximum of 25 per cent of the PRMG allocation
- The PRMG allocation cannot be allocated to the following projects:
  - any costs associated with feasibility studies, tendering & programme management support
  - the hire, purchasing, repairs, maintenance and operational costs of construction plant & equipment
  - improvements (capital expenditure): this comprises works that aim to improve the quality of service on roads with an unacceptable quality of service. These include measures of improving quality of service on existing roads such as increases the width in selected areas (i.e. addition of climbing/passing lanes), increases in the width over the total length of the project i.e. addition of paved shoulder and localized geometric and intersection improvements. These activities could in some instances include complete rehabilitation of the existing pavement structure
  - the upgrading of gravel roads to surface roads, the construction of new roads and new interchanges do not qualify for funding under this grant
  - new facilities (capital expenditure): this comprises works that aim to improve network capacity and includes the upgrading of earth (dirt) road to an engineered gravel road, the upgrading of a gravel road to a surfaced road and upgrading of single carriageway road to four-lane or dual carriageway road. The construction of new gravel or surfaced road where previously no road existed (brown/green fields construction). The construction of new bridge to replace existing bridge or new interchange to replace intersection
- The following amounts per province must be used in 2022/23 for the repair of infrastructure damaged by the natural disaster in KwaZulu-Natal in 2019 and declared in respective provincial gazettes, and as verified by the National Disaster Management Centre (NDMC):
  - 2022/23: R490 million
