 - (4) calls upon the relevant Ministers, including Police, Justice and Constitutional Development, Social Development and Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities, to expedite the implementation of the National Strategic Plan on GBV and femicide; and
 - (5) further calls for swift justice for victims through dedicated courts and harsher sentencing.

- (4) condemns wasteful allocation of resources to initiatives like Green Wardens, while the police are facing critical shortages;

 - (a) prioritize budget allocation for holding cells and resource shortages;
 - (b) re-allocate resources to address staffing and equipment needs;
 - (c) ensure effective policing services to combat GBV and reduce crime; and
- (6) further calls on the Minister of Police to be held accountable through the portfolio committee for implementing these measures.

27. Draft resolution (Mr A Nchabeleng): That the House –

- (1) notes with grave concern reports that Mulilo, a company recently awarded a massive Independent Power Producer contract by Eskom, was co-founded in 2023 by former Eskom Chief Operating Officer, Jan Oberholzer—and that within months of his exit, the company, now owned by a European investment firm, secured contracts reportedly worth over US\$375 million;
- (2) further notes that if these allegations are true, they raise serious red flags about the integrity of Eskom’s procurement processes and confirm suspicions that Eskom’s collapse was engineered to benefit private interests at the expense of the South African people;
- (3) condemns any unethical conduct or insider advantage that may have allowed former Eskom executives or their associates to profit from the very crisis they helped create;
- (4) calls on the Minister of Electricity and Energy to clarify the Mulilo contract award process, and to table all supporting documentation in Parliament;
- (5) further calls for the Portfolio Committee on Electricity and Energy to look into possible irregularities and conflicts of interest, and demands that the IPP contracting process be halted until the investigation is concluded; and
- (6) calls on Parliament to defend South Africa’s energy sector from exploitation and ensure accountability in public procurement.
