Civil Society in a Democratic South Africa

- Civil society: the wide array of non-governmental and not-for-profit organizations that have a presence in public life, expressing the interests and values of their members or others e.g community NGOs, advocacy groups, litigation organisations etc.
- South Africa is a constitutional democracy in which social movements, social justice activists and civil society have spaces in which to express their voices in respect to systemic challenges, barriers and concerns are expressed.
- Civil society takes on a number of causes that are relevant to the lived experiences of vulnerable groups of people in South Africa including children.
- They work collectively or individually to make use of platforms available to ensure change and make sustainable impacts.



- Civil society actors engage in awareness raising activities, lobbying and engagement of duty bearers, protest action, Parliamentary processes for law reform and the courts for judicial redress.
- This was seen in South Africa during the emergence and continuation of the Covid19 pandemic when civil society actors came to the fore as frontline responders and defenders of human rights.
- The role of civil society actors are more pronounced in a pandemic when the unknown arises and quick responses are required from duty bearers. Civil society in the midst of this ensures that the wellbeing and rights of the vulnerable, including children, are safeguarded.



PROVIDING BASIC NEEDS

- The Covid19 pandemic showed that pandemics of this nature often require emergency responses to prevent rising infections.
- Unfortunately these responses also have the risk of resulting in rising needs, particularly for vulnerable groups such as children, excluded groups and people left without their regular incomes.
- Civil society often plays the role of filling gaps left by the state or private sector. This is often times conducted in cooperation with the state and/or private sector.
- The emergence of the Covid19 pandemic saw civil society stepping forward to provide food, personal protective equipment (PPE) and essential sanitary items and other essential needs.



ADVOCACY


- Pandemics such as the Covid19 pandemic bring about changes to the world around us and our particular contexts which then result in:
 - shifting priorities
 - repurposing resources
 - accelerating policy development and more
- Civil society players are able to identify gaps in policy and service provision that could have a concerning impact on vulnerable groups such as children.
- Advocacy is used to address these challenges, barriers and gaps.




EXAMPLE

PROVIDING SERVICE REMOTELY

- Civil society actors have also had to increasingly provide ways in which they can provide their services remotely.
- They have had to expand "their provision of online and phone support, doing remotely what they could no longer do in person. These actions pointed to the growing use of online space by civil society to serve needs and deliver services directly."

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LITIGATION


- The need to ensure access to justice for the vulnerable is key in ensuring oversight and accountability by duty bearers and securing the rights of those "left behind" during a crisis such as a pandemic.
- Litigation organisations in South Africa play a role in ensuring that the rights and wellbeing of children in South Africa are protected and advanced.
- This is no different during a pandemic as will be seen in examples of litigation in 2020 during the height of the Covid19 pandemic.

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
