"On 01 December 2024, South Africa officially assumed G20 Presidency and by extension, the South African Parliament also assumed the responsibility of hosting the 11th P20 Speakers Summit. The group of twenty (G20) is an international forum for economic cooperation whose aim is to develop policies and strategies to tackle current and future global challenges. The objectives of the group of twenty countries are to:

- Promote global economic stability
- Strengthening global economic growth
- Improve global economic governance

South Africa's G20 Presidency also takes place when the world is facing a series of overlapping and mutually reinforcing crises, including climate change, underdevelopment, inequality, poverty, hunger, unemployment, technological changes and geopolitical instabilities."¹

South Africa has therefore indicated that its G20 Presidency *'fully supports the approach of strengthening partnerships and expanding dialogue with a wide range of actors; including States, international organizations and civil society; to collectively shape the G20's approach to issues requiring international cooperation.'*²

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The Role of the Finance and Fiscal Commission (FFC) in Advancing the Women Development Agenda through the Medium-Term Budget Commitments

- **Gender-Responsive Fiscal Policy Recommendations**

The FFC provides annual recommendations to Parliament and government on the **Division of Revenue**. It has the responsibility to advocate for **gender-sensitive budgeting**, ensuring that allocations across national, provincial, and local spheres respond to the specific needs of women, especially in poverty reduction, education, health, economic participation, and safety.

- **Assessment of Budget Commitments Against National Development Goals**

In its analysis of the **Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF)**, the FFC evaluates whether government programmes and spending plans align with national priorities, such as those set out in the **Women's Charter for Accelerated Development, National Development Plan (NDP)**, and international frameworks like the **Beijing Platform for Action** and **Agenda 2063**.

- **Addressing Vertical and Horizontal Equity for Women**

The Commission ensures that provinces and municipalities — where services directly impacting women (e.g., health, education, SMME support, shelter services) are delivered — receive equitable funding. It monitors the **impact of intergovernmental fiscal transfers** on women's development outcomes and can highlight gender gaps in local budget implementation.

- **Promoting Accountability and Oversight**

The FFC plays an essential role in supporting **Parliament's oversight** by providing evidence-based analyses of how fiscal policy impacts marginalised groups, including women. This enables Parliament to hold departments accountable for underperformance or under-budgeting for gender-related programmes.

- **Driving Policy Dialogue and Research**

Through research and public hearings, the FFC facilitates dialogue on inclusive growth, fiscal justice, and gender equity. This informs both its recommendations and the broader public finance discourse.

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Women's Charter Strategic Objectives

- Custom, culture and religion shall be subject to the equality clause in the Bill of Rights, in order to Establish alignment with the constitutional values of Gender Equality
- Protecting the rights of women and girls, particularly those living in rural areas, shall be prioritised by the Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs, including All Traditional structures and Monarchs across South Africa
- Through engagement with Traditional and Religious structures, identify all cultural, religious and customary practices, which are used as mechanisms to exercise strict control over women and girls, particularly women and girls in rural areas.
- Women shall have equal representation on, and participation in all traditional courts, alternative dispute resolution mechanisms and local community courts.
- Through engagement with traditional structures and monarchs across South Africa, develop programmes and legal instruments, to bring an end to All harmful cultural practices such as ukuthwala, female genital mutilation and All other gender discriminatory practices, as identified through public engagement processes

- Accelerating political representation (across political structures) and transformation of all governance, political and civic institutions
- Support for women in local government, Parliament and traditional structures
- Building capacity through Women’s Caucus and mentorship initiatives
- Eliminating Structural Barriers that Prevent Women from Adequately Participating in Political and Civic Life
- Women shall have equal opportunity and access to leadership and decision-making positions at all levels of government, the private sector and civil society organizations
- The IEC shall run awareness campaigns to advance women’s involvement in political and civic life matters

- Interventions in place to ensure that labour market policies effectively facilitate the participation and protection of women's labour rights in the informal market and economy, particularly in a fluid and unfolding post COVID 19 Labour Market Context
- Proposed interventions to effectively use fiscal policy to promote female labour force participation, as well as the protection of and prevention of job losses, which often disproportionately affect women
- Interventions and mechanisms to develop gender sensitive strategies to mitigate and target the widening female casual / contract / temporary employment dilemma.
- Interventions towards adopting gendered labour absorbing strategies – particularly in key sectors that are supported by existing state procurement processes
